This rally has experienced great success in it's previous four years and all members, and especially our new members, are encouraged to come along, to have a great weekend and to assist our hard-working


Rally Committee to raise the flag of the A.C.T. BMW Club.

MOTORCYCLE ELECTRICS (Watch the sparks fly)

No bike can run without electricity, and although electrical failures cause more breakdowns than any other fault, most riders are painfully ignorant about this aspect of their machine. Electricity provides the ignition spark, which makes the engine run, and the power for many other components, such as the lights, which are essential, and electric starters, which are convenient.

The electricity needed by a bike is produced by an engine-driven generator. On most modern bikes this is an alternator. Other machines may have a dynamo or magneto. The power is regulated to produce 12 volts or, on old machines and most trail bikes, 6 volts.

Most machines have a battery to store this power, so that it can be used when the generator is not producing as much as the bike is using. Occasionally the generator is connected straight to the electrical components, and no battery is fitted. This is called 'direct electrics' and means that the ignition and lighting only work when the engine is running.

Each system is connected to the power source, usually by separate wires. One side of the circuit is made by connecting the component to the metal frame of the bike, which is connected to the power source. This is called the earth (ground) connection. The ignition switch controls power to all systems, but each usually has its own switch as well.

The power also flows through one or more fuses. A fuse is a thin piece of wire which burns out quickly if too much current passes through it, stopping the current and so protecting the rest of the circuit.

The ignition system has a separate circuit, switched on by the ignition switch. This circuit includes the contact breaker points (or an electronic trigger), coils and spark plugs. The spark plugs have high-tension leads which are connected with insulated plug caps.

FAULT PREVENTION

There are four main reasons why electrical systems fail:

- 1) A circuit can break because a wire has chafed through.
- 2) A loose or corroded connector stops power getting through.
- 3) A short circuit develops, allowing electricity to find an easier path than through the component usually because a wire has worn through and made contact with the frame to earth.
- 4) The power source itself can fail.

Protection against the first two faults is easy, and consists of making regular checks to see that none of the wires is strained or rubbing, and making sure that all the connections are sound. If a wire is at fault, bind it with insulating tape or replace it. Trouble with connections is often due to water, which corrodes them or causes short circuits. This can be prevented with a moisture dispersant spray or by binding with insulating tape to keep water out. Always clean the connection thoroughly first. Replace corroded connections.

Generators rarely fail and are not easy to repair if they do. Most power failures are due to a faulty battery, so regular checks are important. Keep the fluid level up to the mark by adding distilled water. If the battery is in a low state of charge, use a battery charger to keep it topped up. Make sure the terminals are clean, and prevent corrosion by smearing them with petrolium jelly. (Note, Winter is the time most batteries choose to fail! due to the extra demands placed on them.) Check the other components from time to time, and clean or replace them if they are suspect. Pay particular attention to bulbs, contact breaker points and spark plugs.

It is a good idea to carry replacements for the components which are most likely to wear or which may develop faults. Spare bulbs and fuses are essential (see July issue of this journal for item on safe storage) but also carry replacement spark plugs and contact breaker points (if fitted; K100 owners need not worry themselves with this last item).

MOTOR CYCLE ELECTRICS,

COMPONENT FAULTS

Many electrical faults are easy to check and put right with only simple aids. A circuit tester is a cheap and useful checking tool consisting of a bulb, a battery and two wires, fitted with probes (firm metal ends), so connected that the bulb lights when the two probes touch each end of a conductor, or one another.

At the first sign of an electrical fault, check to see which circuits are working. See whether all have failed at once, or if the fault is confined to one component.

If only one component has failed, such as a light, check to see whether the filament has broken, and then check the fuse for that circuit, as a blown fuse will stop the power. Also check the rest of the wiring for damage, which may have caused the fuse to blow, and repair it before fitting a new one. If the fuse is sound, disconnect the component and check for faults. Apply the probes of a circuit tester to the terminals. If the tester does not light, the component is faulty and you need to fit a replacement.

If both the fuse and the component are sound, check the wiring, including the switch, for breaks.

IGNITION FAULTS

If the engine stops suddenly, remove a spark plug, hold it against the cylinder head and crank the engine over. If there is no spark, check the wiring and plug cap for damage. In wet weather, dry the lead and plug cap thoroughly or treat with a moisture dispersant spray. Check the contact breaker points (if fitted), to see that they are adjusted and operating properly. Electronic trigger mechanisms can only be inspected for physical damage. (So don't get physical with them!) And testing requires sophisticated equipment (i.e. go see Doug...)

Sudden total power failure may be caused by a blown main fuse, which should only be replaced after checking for other faults. It can also be due to a faulty ignition switch, so inspect this carefully, and operate it several times to see whether it works properly. Another cause may be a broken battery lead or loose terminal, so check these and repair if necessary. One of the commonest causes of failure and erratic performance is a bad earth (ground). Locate and check these connections following fuse inspection.

Gradual total power failure is indicated by the lights dimming and the engine stalling at low revs. It is usually due to a faulty charging system, where the bike is running only on the power reserve in the battery, which will not last long. The charging system is difficult to check, but make sure that the battery connections are sound, and inspect the wiring for any damage where power might be leaking away.

A faulty charging system is also difficult to repair, so the best course is not to stop but to ride on, using as little power as possible by avoiding the use of non-essential systems such as turn signals. At night avoid riding if possible, dim lights are an extreme danger to yourself and other road users.

Whenever electrical failure occurs get it properly checked later with a test meter, starting at the component involved - such as a plug cap which might short out when damp. Use your machine's circuit diagram to work through in stages.

HERE'S A BIT MORE INFORMATION ON THE NEW BMW RIDING SUIT-

The trousers and jacket of the BMW GORE-TEX® suit are connected by a zipper round the waist. (1) Integrated stretch-pieces provide excellent elasticity.

The bib-trousers reach far up the sides and back to keep the rider cosy and warm. The elastic braces are therefore relatively short and will not slip off the rider's shoulders. They can be conveniently adjusted by simple catches.

Long zippers down the trouser legs and bib plus the wide cut for extra comfort make it easy to put the trousers on, even on top of other garments. The zippers rest on wide strips of fabric to keep out wind and water. And a velcro fastener keeps the trousers tight at the bottom.

The jacket also offers a wide range of practical features: The high upright collar with soft knitwear lining can be adjusted by zipper. And two-way zippers in the sleeves give the rider optimum adjustment round the shoulders and arms. (2)

The suit therefore always fits perfectly — even on top of a thick pullover.

Two features make the jacket absolutely windproof and watertight: First, the overlapping button strip beneath the diagonal front zipper. (3) Second, the double cuffs with an additional elastic band. (4)

The two inner pockets are absolutely watertight to keep documents safe and sound.
